

For over 20 years, the Siminovitch Theatre

### The Simovitch Prize

Since 2001, the Siminovitch Prize has stood as Canada's most valuable theatre award given to one exceptional director, playwright, or designer every year. This prestigious program is sustained by a growing community of supporters committed to nurturing and celebrating Canadian artistic excellence. By providing significant public recognition and substantial financial support to Canada's most innovative mid-career theatre artists, the Prize encourages groundbreaking and unforgettable theatre experiences.

In December, our community of artists and supporters gathered for the awarding of the Siminovitch Prize shining the spotlight on four remarkable playwrights. **David Yee** was announced as the 2023 Siminovitch Prize Laureate, receiving \$75,000.

### Siminovitch Showcase Documentaries

In 2023, our supporters fueled the creation of four documentaries spotlighting the finalists for the Siminovitch Prize. Originating as a pilot initiative in 2021, this project has grown into a vibrant library showcasing the innovative practices of today's leading theatre artists. These unique, revealing, intimate portraits premiere annually at the awarding of the Siminovitch Prize and are shared across our social channels, website, and newsletter. Our partnership with **Air Canada** has helped expand reach to inflight audiences, enhancing national and international visibility for these celebrated artists, and showcasing theatre practices in Canada.

### Siminovitch Protégé Prize

The Siminovitch Protégé Prize remains a cornerstone of support for emerging talent. Selected annually by the Siminovitch Prize Laureate, this \$25,000 prize recognizes outstanding early-career artists with exceptional promise and dedication to their craft. In 2023, **Julie Phan** was celebrated as the Siminovitch Protégé.

### **Emerging Artists Grants**

In 2023, the Emerging Artists Grants program was launched to increase support for burgeoning new talent. Each Siminovitch Prize finalist designates an emerging artist to receive a \$5,000 grant and a national profile. Additionally, the pair receive an extra \$2,000 to support collaboration.

This program offers vital funding and mentorship, linking recipients with experienced artists to boost their networks and their professional and creative growth. The impact of **The Youssef-Warren Foundation**'s contribution underscores the integrated role that our philanthropic partners play in nurturing the next generation of artistic leaders.

### **Artists In Residence**

In 2023, Siminovitch Prize Laureate, David Yee, and Protégé, Julie Phan, embarked on a two-week residency at the Banff Centre for Arts and Creativity, which offered dedicated time for reflection, research, and creative production. Delivered with the support of the Banff Centre for Arts and Creativity and the National Arts Centre, this residency helps to strengthen mentorship, foster collaboration, and ignite creativity in a supportive environment, free from distractions and surrounded by the beauty of Banff.

### Inspiring Community Connection

The Siminovitch Theatre
Foundation occupies a unique
role as the sole national
platform in Canadian theatre
that fosters connections among
artists and audiences across
disciplines, geography, career
stages, and languages. Over
its 23-year history, the support
of our donor community has
helped develop a network of 108
of the most innovative
Canadian theatre artists.

But our reach doesn't end with the Siminovitch Prize honourees.

At the heart of our strategy is the commitment to breaking down barriers within the artistic community and between audiences. By introducing new artists to each other and exposing audiences to diverse works, we aim to catalyze new collaborations and presentation opportunities.

### Groundbreaking Backstage Conversations

Each Backstage Conversation recording pairs two innovative artists for a unique and intimate exchange, offering audiences a rare glimpse into the minds of creators shaping Canadian theatre.

In 2023, Backstage Conversations proudly showcased the artistic, linguistic, and regional diversity of our network through these engaging dialogues:

These conversations help drive theatre practice forward through the exchange of ideas, while celebrating artists' voices and impact.

### Spotlight on Connection

In 2024, Siminovitch Prize Laureate and finalists David Yee and Berni Stapleton will collaborate with composers Chris Thornborrow and Duane Andrews on Irresistible Neighbourhoods, a double bill of live radio dramas. This exciting project, part of the NAC SPHERE Festival, will feature stories set in Toronto and Newfoundland and Labrador, focusing on the future of Canadian communities and their evolving relationship with water.

### **Digital Resources**

In 2023, we launched the new Siminovitch Theatre Foundation website to serve as a comprehensive archive of all Laureates, finalists, Protégés, emerging artist grant recipients and jurors. Our new digital home is a testament to the incredible community reach and support the Siminovitch Theatre Foundation has garnered, and the generous donors who make this work possible.

A focal point of our digital work was the "Artists' Eye" newsletter.
This monthly publication features in-depth profiles of network members and a comprehensive listing of their productions across the country.

### **Looking Ahead**

Building on the momentum of 2023, the Siminovitch Theatre Foundation is excited to embark on four new endeavours in 2024.

Expanding National Outreach: We are committed to ensuring our programs reflect the full spectrum of regional diversity across Canada, and we are developing live in-person events in major theatre hubs across the country.

Measuring Impact: To better understand our influence over time in the Canadian theatre ecosystem, we are formalizing an impact measurement framework. This initiative will help guide decision-making, allowing us to focus our resources on delivering the greatest impact.

Formalizing the network: What could be achieved if we bring together some of Canada's most creative thinkers? In response to community requests, we are designing an ambitious gathering in 2025 to better connect the network of celebrated Siminovitch Prize recipients and support their networking and skill development.

Engaging Educators: Recognizing the educational and evergreen value of the Siminovitch Showcase documentaries and Backstage Conversations, we are building partnerships with educators. Our goal is to provide unique resources for theatre students and foster a deeper connection between academic learning and real-world theatre practice.

## Maximizing Impact Through Operational Sustainability

As the Siminovitch Theatre Foundation has expanded our program offerings to support Canadian theatre artists, we remain guided by a commitment to strategic and impactful investments. Supported by a growing community of donors, we are proud of our accomplishments in deepening our offerings and achieving longer-term sustainability. In just five years, we have moved from an annual fundraising cycle around the Siminovitch Prize to a portfolio of seven programs and a planning horizon into the next decade.




### 2023 Summarized Financial Statements
