Recognizing Artistic Leadership

Siminovitch Prize

More than an award, the Siminovitch Prize is an investment in artists shaping the future of Canadian theatre. It is an affirmation of their vision, a catalyst for innovation, and a testament to the vital role of theatre in a thriving Canada.

Since its inception in 2001, the Siminovitch Prize has recognized groundbreaking mid-career Canadian directors, playwrights, and designers whose work challenges conventions and reflects the richness of national experiences. One of the few awards that supports artists mid-career, it provides them with the freedom to take risks, experiment, and grow.

Each year, the Laureate receives \$75,000—the largest prize in Canadian theatre—empowering them to advance their artistic practice. In keeping with the Prize's commitment to mentorship, the Laureate selects a Protégé, who receives \$25,000 to support their development.

Three finalists are also recognized, each receiving \$5,000, plus the opportunity to award \$5,000 to an emerging artist of their choosing.

Beyond financial support, the Siminovitch Prize offers national recognition and opportunities which encourage artistic experimentation and mentorship. Finalists and Laureates are each profiled in a dedicated short documentary and gain access to the Siminovitch network, a community of theatre artists at the top of their creative practice.

Being shortlisted or awarded the Siminovitch Prize has a transformative impact on honourees. 86% shared that it provided a sense of professional validation and boosted their confidence as theatre practitioners. Additionally, 84% reported increased visibility and recognition for their work, and 95% credited the Prize with supporting their next creative project or delivering a meaningful financial benefit.



2024 Laureate: Sonoyo Nishikawa

In 2024, the Siminovitch Prize honoured excellence in theatrical design, highlighting visionary designers redefining their fields, including sound, composition, lighting and puppetry.

In December, the theatre community came together to celebrate the four shortlisted artists with the help of gala spotlight sponsor **Blake, Cassels & Graydon LLP**. As part of this celebration, the Siminovitch Prize was awarded to Sonoyo Nishikawa, an internationally acclaimed lighting designer known for her evocative and painterly use of light.

From independent theatre to large-scale opera, Sonoyo's work transforms the theatrical space, crafting atmospheres that shape how audiences see, feel, and experience

performance. As a Siminovitch Prize Laureate, Sonoyo joins a community of artists who are transforming Canadian theatre and inspiring the next generation of theatre makers.

"The light on stage turns on and off, disappears and reappears, according to the ever-changing story, the movements of the performers, the rhythm of the music and the breath of the audience. It's as ephemeral as fireworks. I aim to create lighting designs that give the audience hope for tomorrow, that leave them with a lifetime of inspiration, just like watching a sunrise or sunset."

2024 Finalists

The 2024 Siminovitch Prize also recognized three finalists—each one an exceptional designer expanding the possibilities of storytelling and stagecraft:

- Itai Erdal (Vancouver, BC) A performer, playwright, and lighting designer known for creating deeply atmospheric and personal theatrical experiences.
- **Debashis Sinha** (Toronto, ON) A sound designer and composer who merges technology and tradition to craft immersive sonic landscapes.
- The Old Trout Puppet Workshop

 (Calgary, AB) A puppetry company renowned for its imaginative, all-encompassing design work that transports audiences into entirely new worlds.

Siminovitch Prize Documentaries

What began as a pilot project in 2021 has grown into a rich archive of compelling stories, premiering annually at the Siminovitch Prize ceremony and reaching audiences through our website, social media, and newsletter.

Our partnership with **Air Canada** further amplifies this visibility, bringing the artists' work to national and international audiences inflight.



Investing in Future Talent

Siminovitch Protégé Prize

Selected by the Laureate, the Siminovitch Protégé Prize supports an emerging artist at a pivotal moment in their career. Presented by the **RBC Foundation**, the Protégé Prize provides \$25,000 and a year of mentorship and professional guidance, nurturing future theatre visionaries.

In 2024, Sonoyo Nishikawa selected **Mayumi Ide-Bergeron**, a multidisciplinary artist based in Montreal, as this year's Protégé. A graduate of the National Theatre School of Canada's Set and Costume Design program, Mayumi's work bridges French and English theatre, blending poetic storytelling with an eco-conscious approach.

Thanks to a partnership between the Siminovitch Theatre Foundation, the **National Arts Centre**, and the **Banff Centre for Arts and Creativity**, the 2024 Siminovitch Prize Laureate and Protégé will have the opportunity to collaborate during an artist residency at the Banff Centre in 2025.

Emerging Artists Grants

Launched in 2023 with generous support from The Youssef-Warren Foundation, the Emerging Artists Grants program offers a new way to nurture Canada's rising theatre talent. Each Siminovitch Prize finalist selects an emerging artist to receive national recognition, a \$5,000 grant to support their work, and an additional \$2,000 to facilitate collaboration with their mentor.

These grants provide more than funding—they create space for meaningful mentorship, enabling early-career artists to learn directly from established theatre professionals. By tapping into their mentors' knowledge and experience, recipients gain insights and skills that would take years to develop on their own.

Spotlight on Collaboration

One of the 2024 Emerging Artist
Grants will support an immersive
collaboration between **Debashis Sinha**and emerging theatre artist **Dasha Plett** to deepen Dasha's
expertise in theatrical sound design.

Through this mentorship, Dasha will gain hands-on experience observing Debashis's creative process for upcoming Stratford Festival productions, receive practical training in ATMOS mixing, and take part in structured networking opportunities within Toronto's theatre community.

Mentorship initiatives like this support cross-generational knowledge exchange, expand access to cutting-edge technologies and strengthen professional networks—helping to guide the theatre innovators of tomorrow.

Artists in Residence

In 2024, Siminovitch Prize Protégé and Laureate Julie Phan and David Yee participated in a two-week residency at **Banff Centre for the Arts and Creativity**. The residency, a partnership between the Siminovitch Prize and Banff Centre with support from the **National Arts Center**, provided space for reflection, research, and creative exploration in a supportive and inspiring environment.

"The opportunity to go to Banff and to have the time, capacity, community and care to devote myself to my work helped reinvigorate my practice... I revisited "CPC Barbie," a solo marionette piece that interrogates the idea of idealized womanhood in the Chinese diaspora; a piece I'd found myself blocked on due to the sensitivity of the subject matter... I cherish my experience, all of it—especially the discomfort of being an artist and the breakthroughs that come from it."

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Inspiring Community Connection

The Siminovitch Theatre Foundation is the only national platform in Canadian theatre connecting artists and audiences across disciplines, geography, career stages, and languages. Over its 24-year history, with the support of our donors, we have built a network of 125 of Canada's most innovative theatre artists. But our impact extends far beyond our Siminovitch Prize honourees.

At the heart of our strategy is the commitment to breaking down barriers within the artistic community and between audience members. By introducing new artists to each other and exposing audiences to diverse works, we aim to open doors for new collaborations to be shared and experienced.

The Backstage Conversations series pairs two innovative artists in candid, unscripted discussions, offering audiences a rare glimpse into the creative processes shaping Canadian theatre. Through these recorded dialogues, artists share insights, challenges, and inspirations, sparking meaningful exchanges that drive theatre practice forward.

Foundation and TD Ready Commitment, these Backstage Conversations amplify the voices of those shaping the future of theatre in Canada.

Deepening the National Network

Delivering on our commitment to engaging theatre communities across Canada, the Siminovitch Theatre Foundation partnered with **MobSquad** to host a play reading and artist conversation in Calgary on April 29, 2024. Featuring 2023 Siminovitch Prize Laureate David Yee, 2020 Siminovitch Prize Laureate Tara Beagan, and Lieutenant Governor of Alberta 2023 Distinguished Artist Mieko Ouchi, the evening brought artists and audiences together in a shared exploration of the power of theatre.



With 80 artists and audience members in attendance, the event sparked meaningful dialogue and connection. 81% of participants said they were introduced to a new artist at the event, and 90% said they left feeling more connected to Canadian theatre.

Looking ahead, we will continue to strengthen and engage our national network. As a peer-nominated award, the Siminovitch Prize relies on artists to uplift those in their community. By hosting events across the country, we are actively engaging with theatre communities, expanding the pipeline of future nominees, and ensuring that talent from all regions is recognized and celebrated.

Expanding Access Through Digital Platforms

Beyond in-person gatherings, the Siminovitch Theatre Foundation's digital platforms connect artists and audiences to the conversations advancing Canadian theatre right now.

- Our website serves as a living showcase for the work and impact of Laureates, finalists, jurors, Protégés, and emerging artist grant recipients. It's a space to explore their work and discover the creative voices driving theatre forward.
- The Artist's Eye newsletter offers a behindthe-scenes look at theatre-making across the country, featuring artist profiles, interviews, and a national roundup of productions.

Through these digital resources, we continue to expand access, spark conversations, and celebrate the artists at the heart of our community—wherever they are. If you haven't yet, we invite you to explore these resources and experience the creativity defining the future of the art form.

Shaping the Future

Theatre has long played a role in shaping national identity and bridging differences. In an era of artificial intelligence, digital fragmentation, and political polarization, its role as a space for inclusive and nuanced storytelling is more important than ever.

By bringing people together—physically, intellectually, and emotionally—theatre deepens our understanding of each other and encourages us to embrace complexity with empathy.

Theatre also helps us imagine the future we want to live in. Through our programs, we support artists to challenge assumptions, inspire reflection, and reimagine what is possible.



The Big Idea Experiment

As part of our commitment to investing in the future of theatre, we launched the Big Idea Experiment in 2024—an initiative exploring how groundbreaking theatre artists in the Siminovitch Theatre Foundation network might help solve multi-stakeholder problems in the world around them.

On November 5, 2024, we gathered 24 leaders from theatre, science, engineering, marketing, architecture, medicine, journalism, law, and education for a full-day design thinking session. Together, participants explored how groundbreaking theatre artists' unique skills-storytelling, embodiment, disruption, and resourcefulness—could transform how experts from different fields might work better together to solve complex problems. Initial findings will shape more experimentation and evaluation in 2025 and 2026, where we will transition from exploration to action, launching pilot projects that apply our learnings to real-world challenges.

With donor support, we are creating conditions for the artists in our network to collaborate, and drive innovation in many sectors using groundbreaking theatre imagination. Theatre also helps us imagine the future we want to live in. Through our programs, we support artists to challenge assumptions, inspire reflection, and reimagine what is possible.

Looking Ahead: Celebrating 25 Years

In 2024, we expanded our programs and deepened our support for theatre artists. In the coming year, we will build on this momentum with some key initiatives:

- National Reach We will continue to strengthen our presence in theatre hubs across the country, ensuring artists in all regions benefit from our programs and community.
- Measuring Impact In 2024, we made significant strides in understanding the influence of our work. With new insights, we can refine our programs to ensure they provide the greatest possible support to artists at every stage of their careers.

- **Big Idea Pilot** We will build on our exploration of how theatre artists' unique skills can transform problem-solving and collaboration across disciplines, moving into a pilot phase of research
- Strategic Plan: Our first strategic plan (2023–2025) guided the expansion of our programs beyond the Siminovitch Prize, creating new opportunities to support groundbreaking artists at key stages in their careers. In 2025, we will build on this progress by developing a longer-term strategic plan to further strengthen and expand our impact.

This is just the beginning! As we celebrate 25 years of championing bold and visionary theatre artists, we are preparing to unveil some significant announcements in early April 2025. Stay tuned!



Maximizing Impact Through Operational Sustainability

At the Siminovitch Theatre Foundation, operational sustainability means ensuring there is a national platform to uplift groundbreaking artists and the art form when they need it most - encouraging them to continue to take risks, experiment, and push the boundaries of their craft.

In just five years, we've grown from offering the annual Siminovitch Prize to running seven dynamic programs that foster mentorship, development, and creative connection across Canada. We've done so sustainably, guided by a long-term financial and operational plan, and a growing community of donors.

2024 Financial Overview

In 2024, donor contributions allowed us to invest over \$536,000 directly into artist-driven programs, including the Siminovitch Prize, mentorship initiatives, and emerging artist grants. This funding helped expand national outreach efforts, produce documentary profiles, and strengthen opportunities for Canadian theatre makers.




